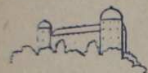

The Gourmet's Guide.

Long before Sweden had become known for her social innovations, weary travellers in search of culinary pleasures had discovered the Swedish cooking. They went into raptures over the meats, the fish made them forget their troubles, the sauces left happy memories. But what brought forth the real superlatives was the hors d'œuvre, or the Smörgåsbord. This old Swedish custom of beginning a luncheon, dinner, or supper follows a certain ritual. One starts out with something salty, a herring of some sort — pickled, cured, or prepared in innumerable different ways. With this goes a drink of snaps to give the appetite the proper edge. After the herring or anchovies have been partaken of, one proceeds to investigate the other dishes, sardellen, tongue, paté de foie gras, salads, ham, cheeses, or the hundred and one different appetizers which belong to a well-equipped Swedish smörgåsbord. However, the real art lies in knowing when to stop, because what follows is also worthy of attention.

The main courses which come after the smörgåsbord depend largely on the season, because the Swedish kitchen routine follows the solstices. Besides the meat and the poultry of the domestic kind, one is always sure to find on the menu some delicacy from the woods in the form of wild game, winged or quadrupedal. While on the subject of woods one should not forget the large variety of berries, mushrooms, etc., which in season find their way to the kitchen. Neither should one, for that matter, overlook the innumerable varieties of fish provided by the sea and the lakes.

The seasonal high spots of the Swedish cuisine are: in Spring, the salmon... nothing quite like it, it's claimed; in August, the crawfish... without which life would be pretty dreary indeed for many a Swede; in November, the goose... cause for much celebration; and so Christmas... with weeks of preparation, when the Swedish kitchen goes the whole hog in the grand old manner.
